Mercy Health Birthing Center updates/ Elise Brown	<ul> <li>3:20- 3:30</li> <li>Continued from July meeting. Focus on topic of health equity. Elise and Carolyn shared the Birthing</li> <li>Center saw a 20% increase in births for 2023 and the trend has continued for 2024. There were 1064</li> <li>births in 2022, 1225 in 2024 and 892 as of 9/1/24 for 2024.</li> <li>The Birthing Center is seeing an increase in Advanced Maternal Age high risk pregnancies and high rates of hypertension.</li> <li>20.9% of C-sections have been primary and are usually due to fetal intolerance. This rate is steady compared to previous rates.</li> <li>-1.8% of births were &lt; 32 weeks gestation</li> </ul>	

	-1.7% were 32-35 weeks gestation	
	-4.8% were 35 +1 week gestation	
	-91.4% were full term defined as greater than 37 weeks gestation	
	The Birthing center has a Wildly Important Goal to increase breastfeeding initiation rates to > 30%	
	exclusively breastfed by 2025. The center is currently at 33.3% exclusively breastfed. *There is exclusion	
	criteria*	
	The Birthing Center is also focusing on a statewide maternal hypertension safety bundle and they are	
	meeting all pieced of the safety bundle. Pieces of the bundle include sending home a BP cuff, follow up	
	appointments, etc.

Barriers:	
-WIC is maxed out and there are lengthy delays to being seen. There is an urgent need for lactation	
support before delivery, at the time of initiation and for the critical first 10 days after delivery and	
beyond.	
-Recommendations:	
*Identify all available lactation support providers and develop a resource database. Start Strong has	
the ability to add this to the resource page on the website.	
*Eliminate barriers for providers to be able to serve and to rapidly train more. 1.) Identify a trainer 2.)	
Identify people willing to be trained 3.) Incentivize training	
* Develop education and information to be shared on social media and more. There is an urgent	
education need for accurate understanding of expected milk volume and for instruction on how to	
hand express (no equipment necessary and more effective than breast pumps).
